If you don't have one of these, you can get a **free** Voter Photo ID at any Virginia voter registration office, including on Election Day!

- Tribal enrollment or other tribal photo ID
 - university located in Virginia
- Student photo ID issued by a school, college, or
- Other U.S. or Virginia government-issued photo ID
 - Virginia Voter Photo ID card
 - Employer-issued photo ID
 - United States passport
 - Virginia DMV-issued photo ID
 - Virginia driver's license

Acceptable forms of identification

If you get to your polling place without photo ID, you will have to vote a provisional ballot.

You need to show your photo ID whenever you vote in person.



Ways to vote

Deadlines



April 9th:

Last day to register to vote *or* update your address for this election.

If you move, your polling place will change. Be sure to update your voter registration address every time you move.

April 24th by 5pm:

Request that an absentee ballot be mailed to you.

April 28th:

Vote an absentee ballot, in person, at your local voter registration office.

May 1st:

Election Day — polls open 6am to 7pm.

What to expect at the polls

When you arrive, Election Officers will be there to help you.

Check in:

Say or write your name and address. Show your acceptable photo ID.

Get your ballot.

Check your ballot.

Does it include all contests for your district?

Go to the voting booth and vote your ballot.

If you are not on the voter list or if you didn't bring a photo ID, an election officer will direct you to vote a provisional ballot.

Accessible voting

Before Election Day

Voters with a disability or illness can vote with an absentee ballot by mail, in person, or curbside before Election Day. Go to <u>vote.virginia.gov</u> to learn more and request your absentee ballot.

On Election Day



There are accessible voting systems at each polling place.

If you are 65 or older, or you have a physical disability, you can vote from your vehicle at the polling place on Election Day. Remember to bring a helper with you who can go in to request your curbside assistance.

Get help reading or writing from an election officer or your own helper.

How to mark a ballot

To vote on a paper ballot:



Make your selection by filling in the oval next to your choice(s).



When you're done, scan your ballot.

Voter rights

You cannot be denied the right to vote if you are legally qualified to do so.

You have the right to:

- Vote if you have been registered at your current address at least 22 days before Election Day.
- · Ask any election officer for help.
- Be shown how to mark and cast your ballot.
- Ask for a new ballot if you want to change your vote before you cast it.
- Vote a provisional ballot if you have no photo ID with you or your name doesn't appear on the voter list and you believe it should.
- · Bring your small child into the voting booth.
- Vote if you are in line by 7pm when the polls close.
